Brunswick and Adelaide PCSO Monthly Update

Hello everyone! This is your current ward update for Brunswick and Adelaide, looking back at the month just gone, and offering current crime prevention advice.

Within the month of June:

- Reports of ASB increased quite a bit from 63 reports in May to 91 reports in June. This was likely down to a few tent encampments in green spaces such as Hove Lawns and Brunswick Square.
- Burglary increased from 1 report in May to 4 reports in June.
- An increase in criminal damage from 7 reports in May to 11 reports in June.

Key Priorities:

- For a reduction of ASB/drug use/drug dealing in the green spaces
- To see more patrols in hotspot areas

Crime Prevention Advice

Following on from last month's ASB awareness and advice, I wanted to provide some links for advice and reporting tent encampments and rough sleepers.

<u>Tell us about someone sleeping rough - StreetLink</u> - report someone sleeping rough to support services.

<u>Street outreach</u> - details BHCC's weekly meetings with partner agencies to review tents in the city.

Partner agencies work together when reports of anti-social behaviour stem from the occupants of a tent encampment on public land. It is important that this is reported to both the police and the council.
