Our priorities this month:

Anti-social behaviour

Youth ASB continues to rise, peaking over the warmer weeks of June. Police remain persistent with high-visibility patrols in **WISH PARK, HOVE LAGOON, BOUNDARY ROAD and DAVIS PARK** to deter and deal with any youth disorder.

Locations such as **SAXON ROAD and BRITTANY ROAD** are being identified as particular hotspots of Youth ASB. As a result of this, patrols will increase in these areas to identify and engage with youths in these areas.

Police continue to work alongside partner agencies to identify and deal with unwanted behaviours and provide reassurance to the community.

Speeding

We have also identified problem areas, namely Olive Road and Portland Road, whereby road users are not abiding by the 20mph restrictions. Both James and I are working with the local councillors and partner agencies to try and prevent and deter these incidents from recurring.

We aim to conduct multiple speed checks throughout the coming weeks/months in the problem areas to collate data and develop a working strategy.

High-visibility patrols

Sussex police are committed to ensuring the safety of all residents and visitors, which is why we have increased our patrols along the beach and promenade. With record breaking heat and an increase of visitors to Wish, Liv and I are spending time engaging with the community and business owners to ensure safety for all people, residents and visitors.

E-Bikes and E-Scooters being driven anti-socially around Wish

We have identified E-Bikes and E-Scooters are being used around the Wish Ward. We have identified locations such as **INGRAM CRESENT EAST** and **INGRAM CRESENT WEST** of E-Bikes and E-Scooters being used around the estate.

As a result of this, there is an increase in patrols around the estate and other hotspots where we will engage with the users and deal with these vehicles robustly if they are being used illegally.

Reporting to the police is critical for action to take place, please continue to do so via the channels listed below. This allows us to build an evidential picture and enables us to direct our patrols to hot spots.
